<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Effective protection requires strong institutions. We will ensure Natural Resources Wales is properly resourced to lead biodiversity recovery, sustainable land management and pollution enforcement.</li><li>• We will strengthen Area Statements to guide local nature recovery and establish the Office of Environmental Governance Wales without delay to provide independent environmental oversight.</li><li>• By 2027 we will introduce legal biodiversity targets, ensuring Wales remains on track to meet international commitments for 2030 and the long-term vision for nature recovery by 2050.</li><li>• We will protect 30% of Welsh land, freshwater and seas by 2030, and ensure all public funding for climate and nature restoration aligns with these goals. A “no regression” principle will prevent future governments from weakening environmental protections.</li></ul>

- We will bring 70% of protected sites 24 into favourable ecological condition by 2030, with the remainder classified as “unfavourable – improving”.
- Tree planting will focus on communities with limited access to green space, while urban development will include long-term tree planning and green infrastructure.
- We will publish a National Rewilding Strategy to support ecosystem restoration, including reintroduction of native species where appropriate and restoration of habitats on public land.
- Legacy environmental risks will also be addressed by stabilising coal tips, tackling contaminated land and applying the polluter pays principle to historic pollution.
- National Parks legislation will be reformed so biodiversity recovery becomes a core purpose alongside landscape protection and recreation
- A national Land Use Framework will guide decisions to ensure land delivers benefits for food security, carbon storage, biodiversity and public access.
- Through a Land Reform Act Cymru and Community Land Fund Cymru, we will expand community ownership of land and strengthen tenant rights.
- We will introduce a Welsh Right to Roam, allowing responsible public access to land and waterways while protecting wildlife and farming livelihoods. Responsible backpack camping will be permitted in appropriate areas, supported by a well-funded national ranger service to educate visitors, protect nature and enforce access rules.
- We will complete the Marine Protected Area network and ensure 30% of Welsh seas are protected, with 10% fully protected from damaging activities.
- We will designate remaining Marine Conservation Zones, ban bottom trawling and dredging within protected areas, and introduce byelaws restricting damaging activities such as destructive fishing methods and seabed disturbance.
- Restoration programmes will rebuild saltmarsh, seagrass meadows, kelp forests and oyster reefs, improve biodiversity and strengthening coastal resilience.
- Local authorities will receive funding to maintain public rights of way and strengthen planning capacity through the employment of ecologists
- We will reduce nutrient pollution by at least 50%, ensure 100% of water bodies are actively monitored by 2027, and strengthen enforcement against pollution offences.
- We’ll deliver better oversight in river catchments including by reducing the threshold for poultry units falling under the Environmental Permitting Regulations (EPR).
- Advice and support programmes will help land managers prevent pollution before it occurs.
- We will work with UK Government to ban “forever chemicals” contaminating rivers and seas

- We will push for stronger regulation of water companies. We will seek the powers from the UK Government to place Dwr Cymru/Welsh Water into special measures, towards genuine public ownership.
- Governance reforms will ensure greater public accountability, including representation for workers, communities and environmental interests.
- Environmental harm will be monitored alongside pollution incidents so companies cannot ignore long-term damage
- We will simplify access to flood defence funding, protect long-term investment in prevention infrastructure and support community flood resilience initiatives.
- We will adopt the latest World Health Organization air quality standards in Welsh law and introduce Clean Air Zones where needed while protecting 26 disadvantaged communities from disproportionate impacts.
- Domestic wood burning will be gradually phased out in urban areas, with support provided to households transitioning to cleaner heating systems.
- We will end this “eco-austerity” approach by matching environmental ambition with stable funding, clear policy and fair markets. Through a Welsh Good Food Bill and a national Land Use Framework, we will align food production, climate goals, public health and biodiversity recovery
- The Sustainable Farming Scheme (SFS) will provide stable, multi-year commitments so farmers can plan for the long term. Payments will be delivered on time and designed to reward farmers fairly for the environmental public goods they provide.
  - The Sustainable Farming Scheme will be the central mechanism for delivering climate and nature outcomes across agriculture.
  - At least two-thirds SFS funds will be allocated to the Optional and Collaborative layers by 2030. This includes prioritising investment in Nature-based solutions which help to build climate resilience and protect farmers and communities from the impacts of flooding and drought
- We will introduce a Land Reform Act Cymru and Community Land Fund Cymru to strengthen tenant security and expand community ownership of land. At the UK level we will press for a ring fenced, multi-year agricultural budget that reflects Wales’s climate, food and nature priorities.
- New regulated green finance mechanisms will also help farmers invest in sustainable practices, diversification and long-term resilience
- Public procurement will play a key role in creating stable markets. Welsh schools, hospitals and public institutions should prioritise locally produced food wherever possible. Local food hubs and regional processing infrastructure will strengthen supply chains and keep value within communities.
- An Organic Action Plan will aim for 10% of farmland to be organic by 2030, supporting farmers who wish to transition and helping meet growing consumer demand.
- We will introduce National Minimum Standards covering soil protection, nutrient management, slurry storage, pesticide use, animal welfare and habitat protection
- Sales of horticultural peat will be ended, and we will support a transition away from fossil-fuel-derived nitrogen fertilisers.

- We will reduce reliance on these imports by supporting home-grown protein crops and diverse pasture systems.
- We will ensure fairer access for small farms, new entrants and young growers, by having minimum SFS payment thresholds for small horticultural enterprises and by ensuring that regulation is proportionate to risk and therefore targeted to larger farms involved in more intensive agriculture.
- Trade rules must not allow imports produced to lower environmental or welfare standards to undercut Welsh farmers.
- Stronger local food partnerships will coordinate regional food systems and ensure communities play a direct role in shaping food policy.

#### Other

- Communities will be supported to protect and manage green spaces and heritage sites, recognising their importance for cultural life and wellbeing.
- Wales's landscape also provides opportunities for outdoor adventure and nature-based tourism. We will invest in infrastructure supporting walking, cycling, climbing and other outdoor activities.
- A fair, rules-based Welsh Right to Roam will allow responsible access to the countryside while protecting nature and communities, including education opportunities for the general public in how to look after the environment.
- Our approach will be built on clear foundations: healthier homes, cleaner air and water, safer communities, access to nature, healthy local food, strong early years support, social connection, active living and community wellbeing. We will expand Nature for Health programmes to improve physical and mental wellbeing, strengthen social prescribing for adults and introduce age-appropriate social prescribing for children, and make movement part of everyday life through safe walking and cycling routes, greener neighbourhoods and better public transport
- The Green Party will lead a rapid transition to a clean, safe, resilient and community-owned energy system that tackles climate change while reducing fuel poverty and creating skilled jobs across Wales.
- Renewable energy must be developed responsibly. Infrastructure such as pylons and grid upgrades will be carefully planned to avoid damage to sensitive ecosystems and protected landscapes.
- A Methane Action Plan will coordinate measures across agriculture, waste and energy to reduce methane emissions.
- A Green Transformation Fund will unlock long-term investment in renewable infrastructure and climate solutions. We will work with the Wales Pension Fund to support investment in Welsh energy projects.
- Our National Green Jobs Plan will ensure workers have the skills needed for renewable energy deployment, building retrofit, land restoration and environmental innovation.
- We will not weaken Wales's climate commitments. We will require all new laws to demonstrate "no regression" on environmental protections. The Green Party opposes nuclear power, including small modular reactors. We will maintain the ban on fossil fuel extraction, including coal mining, oil and gas drilling and fracking, and we will not support new high-carbon infrastructure.

- To accelerate progress we will continue to call for devolution of the Crown Estate so Wales can control its own renewable resources and keep the economic benefits within Welsh communities.
- The curriculum should prepare young people for the world they will inherit. We will ensure it combines play and fun with eco-literacy, health and wellbeing education, food literacy and relationships education inclusive of LGBTQIA relationships, alongside civic education that prepares students for democratic participation
- We will establish a Green Transformation Fund for Wales, a not-for-profit public body that will finance major climate and nature restoration projects. The fund will raise investment, develop infrastructure and generate long-term returns through leases, rents and power purchase agreements

- Cut carbon emissions to meet the current carbon budget and the next. We will keep our ban on fracking, oppose fossil fuel extraction, and work towards our ambition for a net zero public sector by 2030.
- Protect 30% of our lands and seas for nature by 2030 and set new, robust and legally binding targets for restoring nature.
- Set up a new environmental governance body for Wales and drive action on the nature and climate emergencies through Nature Estate Cymru.
- Work to ban the sale of horticultural peat.
- Re-introduce key species like beavers and make all new homes nature-friendly by design with measures like swift bricks and more.
- Clean up our rivers and seas by introducing a Clean Water Bill for Wales, creating a new water regulator and funding a dedicated war chest to crack down on the people polluting our rivers.
- Reduce agricultural pollution, especially in areas where it harms water quality.
- Take the final steps to establish the new National Park in North-East Wales.
- Create more green spaces in communities and create an urban rewilding taskforce to help nature thrive in towns and cities.
- Grow the National Forest for Wales and create the first ever National Forest Trail from North Wales to South Wales. We will plant more trees than ever before and increase their protections. We will support a sustainable timber industry.
- Introduce new Marine Conservation Zones. We will promote sustainable fisheries, support seaweed and seagrass habitats, and collect more disused fishing gear from the sea.
- Host a dedicated Nature Investment Summit to leverage private sector funding for nature in Wales.
- Maintain record funding for flood defences to protect homes and businesses. We will work with communities and nature to improve flood protection, including through planting trees and restoring peatland.

- Make more than 400 disused coal tips safer. We will set up the Disused Tips Authority in Merthyr Tydfil, and harness new technologies in coal tip safety.
- Fund the development of new jobs and skills in flood defence, marine and nature restoration, mines remediation and coal tip safety.
- Address the legacy of contaminated land sites, including historic landfill sites and sites affected by forever chemicals.
- Work to ban more single-use plastics to tackle the scourge of littering. We will deliver a UK-leading bottle return scheme and introduce new statutory reuse targets for local authorities.
- Improve air quality with a new statutory target and roll out our new regulations to tackle engine idling outside schools, hospitals and care homes.
- Continue to develop the Sustainable Farming Scheme to boost sustainable food production and increase support for farmers to tackle the climate and nature emergencies.
- Encourage more people to grow, shop and eat local. We will aim to increase the amount of Welsh public sector spend on food of Welsh origin by at least 50% by 2030.
- Ban greyhound racing and make cat microchipping mandatory. We will regulate animal welfare establishments and the keeping of exotic pets. We will also explore strengthening the RSPCA's statutory enforcement powers and introducing a Pet Abduction Bill.
- Increase restrictions on the shooting of gamebirds, support a UK-wide ban on trail hunting, and maintain our ban on the mass culling of badgers.

Welsh Liberal Democrats

- End the sewage scandal by legislating to ban raw sewage dumping in our waterways, banning bonuses for water bosses until discharges and leaks end, and replacing Ofwat with a tough new Welsh regulator with real powers to prevent sewage dumps.
- Introduce a 'blue corridor' programme for rivers, streams and lakes to ensure clean and healthy water and setting new 'blue flag' standards.
- Set meaningful and binding targets to stop the decline of our natural environment and double nature by 2050.
- Pass a comprehensive Wildlife Act for Wales to clarify and strengthen protections for animals.
- Give Natural Resources Wales the funding and resources it needs to monitor pollution properly and tackle it effectively.
- Deliver a long-term national strategy for flood and coastal erosion resilience, with a 30-year vision and a catchment-based approach to protecting communities.
- Ensure that nature-based solutions form a critical part of tackling climate change, storing carbon and reducing flooding.
- Provide adequate financial support for woodland planting, habitat creation and SSSIs based on realistic cost assessments and use of low-cost, close-to-nature approaches, and seek to reduce regulation to facilitate natural approaches.
- Invest to make Wales a world-leader in tidal and hydro power - finally delivering the Swansea Bay Tidal Lagoon after years of broken promises by successive governments.
- Accelerate floating offshore wind in the Celtic Sea thereby attracting turbine and foundation manufacturing to Welsh ports.
- Drive a rooftop solar revolution through new legislation to ensure that solar panels are installed on all new homes and large buildings, as well as car parks and other grey spaces. •
- Protect funding for small-scale hydro projects, which Labour have tried to cut multiple times since 2021.
- Press the UK Government to explore zonal electricity pricing, incorporating a separate Welsh zone, to make electricity cheaper in areas with plentiful renewable energy and end the scandal whereby Welsh consumers and businesses subsidise electricity for consumers in London and South East England.
- Invest an extra £50 million a year to support profitable, sustainable and nature-friendly farming in Wales.
- Enable an orderly and just adoption of the new farming payments scheme through investment in training and advice, and transition grants for those in need.
- Introduce a National Food Strategy for Wales to ensure food security, tackle food poverty and improve the health and nutrition of every family

- We will deliver an updated Climate and Nature Action Plan for Wales, focused on charting a practical pathway to net zero by 2040 and prioritising community energy, green skills and jobs, cleaner transport, energy-efficient homes, and the protection and restoration of nature-rich landscapes.
- Embed decarbonisation, sustainability and environmental protection as cabinet level, cross-cutting responsibilities across all portfolio areas
- Strengthen accountability by providing clear public reporting on Wales's progress towards net zero through an accessible online dashboard.
- Improve Wales's preparedness for climate impacts by publishing a regularly updated climate risk assessment.
- Establish a Just Transition Board to guide net zero strategy – bringing together relevant experts and ensuring key stakeholders have a meaningful role in shaping policy.
- Under the Environment (Principles, Governance and Biodiversity Targets) Act, we will establish a strong and independent Office for Environmental Governance Wales (OEGW) that is able to hold public authorities to account for delivering on environmental targets
- We will support the National Nature Service for Wales as a vehicle for increasing eco-literacy, growing green skills and creating new jobs and livelihood opportunities in nature recovery.
- We will work with other UK nations to ban the sale of horticultural peat and continue work on peatland restoration.
- In reviewing and reforming spatial planning, we will seek the right balance between food security, nature recovery and access to nature, local development needs, and renewable energy when it comes to land use. And we will improve marine planning and promote the sustainability of our coastal and marine environments.
- We will ensure that planning regulations better facilitate the green transition, including through firmer consenting timelines for renewable energy projects and permitted development rights for heat pumps, household solar and other small-scale renewables.
- As an immediate priority in government, we will develop a National Energy Strategy, mapping Wales's current and future energy needs and setting out a clear, long-term plan for the infrastructure required to meet them.
- A new Renewable Energy Sector Deal will coordinate action between government, the renewables industry, further and higher education, communities and trade unions, while providing clearer planning requirements and firm, predictable consenting timelines for renewable energy projects.
- Central to this ambition is devolving the Crown Estate and retaining the full value of leasing Welsh land and our seabed for renewable energy.
- Extend permitted-development to give households, farms and businesses much greater flexibility to install their own small wind turbines, rooftop and small ground mounted solar, batteries and heat pumps.
- Ensure the scale, siting and cumulative impact of energy developments – including transmission and distribution infrastructure – are properly considered through the planning system, favouring well-designed, appropriately dispersed projects that balance local impact with efficient delivery, while protecting productive agricultural land.

- Formally request the full devolution of powers over water in Wales, as provided for by the Wales Act 2017.
- Establish a new Welsh water regulator, with powers to set made-in-Wales price controls, limit excessive water-company bonuses, and direct capital investment in reducing sewage spills, wastewater and drainage upgrades, and wider environmental improvements.
- We will set new and enforceable targets to reduce pollution in our rivers and seas, based on the ‘polluter pays’ principle and prosecuting serious and serial offenders as necessary.
- We will collect more and better data on pollution incidents and work to ensure every water body in Wales achieves a minimum ‘good’ status – including by moving from the outdated ‘farming by calendar’ approach on tackling run-offs from agriculture, to a science-led, outcome-based and risk appropriate system that prevents pollution while supporting sustainable farming.
- Create a Flood Resilience and Preparedness Forum for Wales, bringing together local authorities, Natural Resources Wales, emergency services, and community organisations to coordinate national strategy on flooding
- Review the governance arrangements for Internal Drainage Districts to best support landowners and communities to manage flooding effectively.
- Take a whole catchment approach on investment in flood defences – including upstream, nature-based solutions – ensuring that this investment delivers long-term and durable protection from flooding, as well as value for money.
- Establish a Wales-wide strategy on remediating contaminated land – mapping, prioritising and progressively restoring post-industrial land so communities are no longer exposed to derelict sites, toxic soils, and polluted waterways.
- Explore ways of strengthening the ‘polluter pays’ principle, in conjunction with the UK government, so that those who have profited from the impacts of heavy industry are held legally responsible for fully restoring the land.
- Work with the UK Government to ban so called ‘forever chemicals’ that continue to contaminate our land, rivers and seas.
- Promote nature-based and sustainable remediation techniques, such as wetland creation, soil restoration and planting schemes that help absorb pollutants, stabilise slopes, and enhance biodiversity.
- Phase out unnecessary single-use plastics, starting with packaging for fresh fruit and vegetables where this offers negligible benefit for shelf life, reducing the amount of plastic that ends up as litter or microplastics in our food and ecosystems
- We will maintain strong collaboration with the farming community as we implement the Sustainable Farming Scheme (SFS), and continue to evolve and refine it – supporting thriving and sustainable farm businesses to produce food, while also progressively delivering key environmental outcomes.
- Establish a multi-year funding cycle for the SFS, giving farmers long-term stability and certainty, taking the first one-year budget as the baseline.
- Commission an independent review of the bureaucratic burden on family farms in Wales, with a view to streamlining on-farm requirements and reducing duplication and unnecessary paperwork.

- Implement a new science-led, outcomes based and risk-proportionate approach to managing nitrate vulnerability across catchments – moving beyond the outdated ‘farming by calendar’ approach and supporting farmers to adopt new technologies and practices to reduce agricultural water pollution.
- Maintain robust biosecurity standards and draw on the advice of the TB Technical Advisory Group in implementing a new approach to managing bTB – one which recognises wildlife as a source of infection and enables scientifically validated control methods.
- Protect high-quality agricultural land from being lost to large-scale corporate carbon offsetting plantations or excessive solar developments, while making it easier for farmers and rural communities to invest in their own renewable energy projects.
- Food Strategy for Wales
  - Develop new, official ‘Made in Wales’ branding that provides consumers with clear information on product sourcing and the carbon-cost savings of buying local.
  - Work with major retailers to ensure that every supermarket has a dedicated Welsh produce section.
  - Promote and support community food hubs and initiatives that expand food literacy, and increase the availability and affordability of healthy, locally-produced food.
  - Work strategically, including through our new National Development Agency, to drive innovation and business development in food and farming, fisheries and aquaculture, and increase value-added food processing in Wales.
  - Target and incentivise a progressive increase in horticultural production, with the ambition that 25% of vegetables served in Welsh Schools will be of Welsh origin by 2030.
  - Use public procurement to better support our food and drink sector, increasing the proportion of publicly procured food that is of Welsh origin from 23% to at least 50%.
  - Introduce a whole-school approach to food, with food literacy and cooking a core part of the curriculum, an audit system for school lunches, and the promotion of excellence in school catering.
- We will also develop a tailored Rural Development Strategy for Wales, drawing on international best practice to tackle poverty and create new economic and social opportunities.
- To grow Wales’s tree cover and help build a thriving timber industry, we will:
  - Promote tree and hedge planting, and support farmers to integrate trees into their businesses through agroforestry, small scale commercial forestry and biochar.
  - Prioritise native woodland creation, restoration, and mixed woodlands – protecting high-quality agricultural land and avoiding large-scale corporate plantations created solely for carbon offsetting.
  - Extend tree and hedgerow cover targets to land owned or managed by public bodies.
  - Boost urban tree cover, giving priority to applications and funding for communities with the lowest existing coverage.
  - Use public procurement to develop the supply chain for Welsh timber, promote innovation and business growth in the sector via the new National Development Agency, and work with the sector to deliver on the Welsh Timber Industrial Strategy.

- Champion Welsh fisheries, supporting the fishing industry as a vital part of Wales's food system and coastal economy, and work to improve access to European and wider global markets for Welsh fish and seafood.
- Provide tailored, long-term funding through the Welsh Marine and Fisheries Scheme to support sustainable fishing businesses, improve resilience, and help the Welsh fishing fleet adapt to future challenges.
- Develop a new Marine Planning Framework to replace fragmented and overlapping approaches to marine management. This framework will be built on genuine co management, with commercial and small scale fishers fully involved in shaping decisions, alongside environmental, community and industry stakeholders.
- Promote sustainable fishing practices and aquaculture, and strengthen protection within the Marine Protected Area (MPA) network by phasing out damaging activities such as bottom trawling and dredging where the evidence shows that these threaten sensitive habitats, alongside fair transition support, robust science, and effective monitoring and enforcement, working with the UK Government and other partners to ensure Welsh conservation measures are applied consistently and fairly.
- Support a National Seagrass Plan, and the growth of Wales's seaweed industry – streamlining marine licensing, encouraging responsible cultivation, and helping to build a strong, resilient Welsh seaweed supply chain.
- Implement a seabird conservation strategy and maintain strong biosecurity measures to protect important breeding and feeding areas.
- Reduce regulatory barriers to building and buying-in more social homes, including through more balanced energy efficiency requirements.
- To further improve access to affordable housing in rural areas in particular, we will examine options for extending permitted development rights for single dwellings and converting farm buildings for residential use.
- Take a community-centred approach that protects and strengthens local leadership in setting planning priorities. r residential use.
- Reduce the complexity and bureaucracy of planning processes, providing greater clarity and firmer guarantees on consenting timelines, and extending permitted development rights, including for community-led housing and energy projects, and small-scale renewables.
- We will produce a new National Development Framework, giving real strategic vision and oversight.

- Ban New Onshore Wind and Solar Farms
  - Ban new onshore wind farms: Wales has reached saturation point with unreliable, weather dependent renewables that blight the Welsh countryside. We will ban new onshore wind farms and use ministerial call-in powers to end the use of significant areas of productive arable land for solar farms that undermine food security and can harm the soil. We will maintain guidance that new power lines should be underground where possible
- Abolish NRW

- Operational and regulatory functions will be separated and streamlined so that flood defence, forestry, marine licensing, and environmental protection continue without interruption. Environmental governance in Wales will be proportionate, transparent, and aligned with economic renewal. As explained above, the overall number of quangos will fall under Reform
- Scrap Net Zero in Devolved Policy
  - Reform will abolish the 2030 and 2040 devolved Net Zero targets and slash reporting requirements to the bare legal minimum. We will end the use of Net Zero targets as the overriding driver of devolved Welsh energy, planning, and local government decisions. We will replace it with a clear focus on affordability, reliability, and domestic energy security. Where environmental legislation has been used to drive up costs, delay infrastructure development, or undermine growth, it will be repealed or amended. This includes the Environment (Wales) Act 2016. Net Zero-based local strategies that raise costs without measurable benefit will be ended
- End Subsidy Dogma
  - Reform will remove ideology from Welsh Government energy subsidies. Energy efficiency and fuel poverty subsidies like Nest will be focused on those on the lowest incomes who need help. Funding for low-carbon industrial heat and heat networks will be scaled back. Heat pump funding will be terminated.
- Review EU Environmental Law
  - Legacy EU laws fail to protect the environment and make it harder to build infrastructure. Reform will review and change retained EU environmental regulations within the devolved competence to remove duplication, unnecessary burdens, and obstacles to infrastructure delivery while maintaining core protections
- A Welsh Rivers Act (address sewage discharge, support catchment-wide nutrient management, and reward measurable improvements).
  - We will conduct a Wales-wide consultation and develop a strategy to protect our rivers based on global best practice. Legislation will address sewage discharge accountability, support catchment-wide nutrient management, and reward measurable water quality improvements.
- Act as an Enabler, not an Obstacle, to nuclear power
- Energy Security and Industrial Renewal
- Protect Rural Homes and End the War on Off-Grid Wales
- Streamlined Planning
  - Too many vital infrastructure projects die waiting for bureaucratic approvals. We will create a fast track route for major industrial and infrastructure schemes.
